














## welcome to FLORIDA KEYS CULTURE

## Teaching my 6-year-old son about the local environment and ways we can protect it have been cornerstones in my parenting.

Teaching my 6-year-old son about the local environment and ways we can protect it have been cornerstones in my parenting. The belief that nature provides direct benefits to our well-being and that our connectedness to it is fundamental in our motivation to protect it were established from my own experience with it, but is also backed by science. One study states: "The positive relationship between connection to nature and conservation behavior suggests that increasing the level of connection in the population, particularly in children, could encourage more conservation behavior, the desired outcome for conservation success."

As a community all too aware of the current climate challenges, the Florida Keys offers opportunities aplenty to nurture visiting children's bond with nature and set the tone for a more environmentally conscious future. Whether it's educational programs provided by the islands most impactful conservation organizations or the curated gardens and nature conservatories perfect for inspiring a sense of wonder and exploration, visiting these local spots are sure to color your child's vacation with positive memories of nature. Recently, my son and I traveled down Overseas Highway to experience some of them first-hand.

Our first stop in Key Largo was at MarineLab for Family Day, which occurs the second Sunday of every month. These events offer the unique opportunity for families to learn about the environment together and have fun while they're at it. During our visit, we contributed to a 30-year ongoing study of marine invertebrates in Largo Sound. In the lab, we identified a variety of tiny invertebrates on a live rock and then headed outside to the lagoon for snorkeling. The lagoon is home to marine life like fish and lobsters as well as the famous, Jules Undersea Lodge.

Part of MarineLab's mission is to foster environmental awareness and stewardship so I was curious about their views on how children fit into the world of conservation. MarineLab's Outreach Coordinator shared her thoughts: "I think that children are central to the conservation community...And it would be a disservice not to include them in the conversation. At MarineLab, my goal is to open up the conversation and to welcome the thoughts and ideas of our students. I want them to know that their thoughts are valid and important. Because they are!"

In addition to MarineLab, there are many options to visit outdoor spaces that educate in the Upper Keys such as the Key Largo Coral Nursery and the Florida Keys Wild Bird Center. Both organizations offer up close interactions with local ecosystems and wildlife. For those that want to give back on their vacation, these locations also have opportunities for adults and teens alike to get involved via Voluntourism.

Next, we arrived in Marathon where we opted for a familyfriendly activity with one of the Florida Keys most lovable residents, sea turtles. At the Turtle Hospital we learned about the five sea turtle species found in Florida and the common threats they face. During the tour of the facility, we saw the surgical room, met the patients, and learned their names and histories. At the end, we all got a chance to feed them.

Marathon has a variety of opportunities to interact with wildlife. For example, Crane Point Hammock Museum and Nature Center hosts the Marathon Wild Bird Center, four butterfly gardens, and a tidal pool where the whole family can giggle while receiving a "fish pedicure".

Off the tip of Marathon underneath the Old 7 Mile Bridge is Historic Landmark, Pigeon Key, which boasts "The Ultimate Family Island Experience". A tour of this small island paradise is filled with fascinating history that will take you back in time as well as outdoor fun like snorkeling, fishing, and enjoying an oceanside picnic. As an adventure that starts with a train ride and ends with a shark feeding, you can expect unforgettable memories for all ages.

If passing through Big Pine Key, a must-see is the National Key Deer Refuge. Within the refuge lives the Keys exclusive, Key deer, smallest of the white-tailed deer species. Traverse one of four trails or visit popular viewing point, Blue Hole Observation Platform, to catch a sight.

Also in Big Pine Key, Grimal Grove is a one-of-a-kind experience for foodies and children with a taste for adventure. This tropical fruit oasis and the only breadfruit farm in the U.S. offers a guided tour that teaches about sustainable farming and includes interactive experiences like picking and tasting rare tropical fruits and making sugar cane juice.

We made our way farther south to Summerland Key for a tour of Mote's Elizabeth Moore International Center for Coral Reef Research & Restoration. Here, we learned about the process of coral micro-fragmentation and met the scientists behind Mote's research on water quality and coral growth and spawning. After the tour, we all participated in a micro-fragmenting workshop.

I asked our guide who is also Mote's Lower Keys Education Coordinator, her insight on how educational programs help

foster the bond between children and nature: "The future of our planet and our oceans are in the hands of the youngest generation. I believe that we must educate our youth about the importance of conserving our planet in order to save it. Conservation starts with education! As I teach, I have witnessed the moment students are inspired and want to make change! That is really special to be a part of. As students participate in Mote's education programming, they are eager to learn/participate more and more!"

Our last stop was the southernmost point, Key West, and on the agenda was a visit to the Key West Butterfly & Nature Conservatory. Like a reduced sauce that brings out more flavor, this relatively small

As a matter of fact, there is no limit to inspiring a child's sense of wonder in Key West. Its outdoor spaces are no exception. The Key West Tropical Forest & Botanical Garden, for example, on top of being a fantastical 15-acre arboretum, wildlife refuge, and education center, also offers ongoing kid-centric events such as story time in the garden and art workshops. Additionally, The Key West Wildlife Center, the Key West Garden Club, and the Florida Keys Eco-Discovery Center are just a few others that offer the opportunity to explore while also



In trying to understand the natural world, humans must rely on the only toolset in their possession, so we evaluate animals based on the criteria we know. We canonize the strongest horses, the fluffiest pets and, in the ocean, the 'cutest' swimmers with the least imposing teeth, often representing them in both popular and fine art.

Turtles, sharks, dolphins and manatees are all undeniably incredible creatures, but artists who solely depict the darlings of the marine world aren't conveying the whole picture. The Florida Keys are home to a spectacular wealth of wildlife beneath the ripples. Some are aquatic celebrities, well-loved and oft-tattooed, like the five species of sea turtles found in our crystalline waters. Others are less recognizable, but no less enchanting. Take for example the lowly sea hare, a marine gastropod mollusk. A person's first encounter with this less-than-majestic, shell-less sea snail may not inspire immediate enthusiasm. But then they learn that this hapless creature has survived millennia as a hermaphroditic, essentially blind organism, and curiosity is piqued. If this same person was given the chance to hold the creature, they would see two waggling rhinosphores – the "ears" (actually scent-seeking organs) which give the hare its name. But then, the sea hare likely becomes nervous about being

handled and engages its only defense mechanism, a release of 1980s-neon hued purple ink. If the person holding our little slug caught a whiff of that ink, they would note that it smells exactly like roses. By this point, the realization is probably sinking in that they are holding in their slimy hands (or just hastily dropped) a little bit of otherworldly magic.

The list of living aesthetic wonders goes on indefinitely, and for those willing to look, the waters of The Florida Keys hold all kinds of visual surprises. Once an artist, a kid, a tourist, or even a biologist allows themselves the opportunity to broaden their vision, the tropical waters open up to reveal all sorts of strange, beautiful things. Suddenly there are snowflakes floating in the marina. Actually, they're Cassiopeia jellyfish, but the cold white shapes perfectly mimic wildly magnified flakes. Closer inspection reveals that they can be held without risk of a sting. Also known as upside-down jellyfish, these complete, independently functioning machines eventually plant themselves on the seafloor, tentacles aimed at the sunshine for necessary photosynthesis, which yields just enough algae growth for them to devour.

Some creatures mimic snowflakes, others literally glow. When all the conditions of temperature, tides, and season perfectly

align, bioluminescent shrimp can be found shimmering bright blue under a new moon sky. Others change colors. On a still morning with placid waters, someone walking down a dock might notice, squeezed between rocks, a white octopus shifting to blue, then purple. Still others, like Spotted Eagle Rays and Parrotfish, carry constant unique markings and coloration. In the clear shallow waters of The Keys, it's not unusual to spot a ray gliding elegantly by, polka-dots on full display. And almost everyone who has stuck their face in the water near mangrove roots has seen a Rainbow Parrotfish showing off a hundred tropical hues on one little body.

The beauty of these discoveries isn't just in the beauty itself. A simple moment of unexpected awe leads to appreciation, which in turn leads to an understanding of the need for conservation. When we find the beauty in what was initially unseen or easily dismissed, we start to realize the extent of interconnectivity in this environment. An ocean without upside down jellyfish doesn't support sea turtles. Powerful sharks and freakishly adorable manatees don't exist in

waters that can't maintain the health of sea hares. There are intricacies at play in The Keys that are difficult to understand without getting your hands wet.

Once the connections click, it's easier to see the importance of unilateral conservation. Entities like the National Marine Sanctuary understand this need perfectly, as evidenced by the 3,800 square nautical miles they have preserved as both a preserve and a playground for the snorkelers and divers who seek experiences with these animals in their natural habitat. Explorers can further aid conservation efforts through voluntourism, or ecotourism. Organizations

throughout The Keys, and up to Miami, offer 'citizen science' opportunities wherein tourists can swap the pub crawl for a chance to plant coral propagules, tag sharks for tracking, or walk the shoreline for a beach cleanup.

Especially for artists, those great observers of the world, these intimate experiences with the world below the surface reveal unparalleled inspiration. Creative wanderers willing to wade into the muck, or pull on a mask to peek under a coral head, are rewarded with a wonderland that would require a full palette of colors to convey.

And yet, the fact remains that we hold commonly represented sea creatures in our collective consciousness for a reason. They've captured our fascination over innumerable years,

becoming emblematic of freedom, warmth and vacation. It's a justifiable love that inspires people to foster an ongoing connection to the marine environment. On a more basic level, these animals simply elicit that very human response of "wow, look at that!" All of these moments inspire us to look beyond ourselves and our very human perspective of the world. But, it's worth considering that source material, inspiration, and engagement can come from a revered symbol of the tropics. or from a simple organism that some might refer to as a slug.




